Obituary of Jesus of Nazareth

Jesus Christ, 33, of Nazareth, died Friday on Mount Calvary, also known as Golgotha, the place of the skull. Betrayed by the apostle Judas, Jesus was crucified by the Romans, by order of the Ruler Pontius Pilate. The causes of death were crucifixion, extreme exhaustion, severe torture, and loss of blood.

Jesus Christ, a descendant of Abraham was a member of the house of David. He

was the Son of the late Joseph, a carpenter of Nazareth, and Mary, His devoted Mother. Jesus was born in a stable in the city of Bethlehem, Judea. He is survived by His mother Mary, His faithful Apostles, numerous disciples, and many other followers.

Jesus was self educated and spent most of his adult life working as a Teacher. Jesus also occasionally worked as a Medical Doctor and it is reported that he healed many patients. Up until the time of His death, Jesus was teaching and sharing the Good News of God's forgiveness and Love, healing the sick, comforting the lonely, feeding the hungry, and helping the poor.

Jesus was most noted for telling parables about His Father's Kingdom and performing miracles, such as feeding over 6,000 people with only five loaves of bread and two fish, and healing a man who was born blind. On the day before His death, He held a Last Supper celebrating the Passover Feast, at which He foretold His death & gave His followers the gift of Himself in the Eucharist.

His body was quickly buried in a stone grave, which was donated by Joseph of Arimathea, a loyal friend of the family. By order of Pontius Pilate, a boulder was rolled in front of the tomb. Roman soldiers were put on guard.

In lieu of flowers, the family has requested that everyone try to live as Jesus did. Donations may be sent to anyone in need.

Faith Corner

Palm Sunday

Palm Sunday is the 6th and last Sunday of Lent and the beginning of Holy Week. It marks the celebration of the solemn entry of Christ into Jerusalem. Palm Sunday is known as such because the faithful receive palm fronds which they use to reenact Christ's arrival in Jerusalem. In the Gospels, Jesus entered Jerusalem riding on a young donkey and to the lavish praise of the townspeople who threw clothes or possible palm or small branches, in front of Him as a sign of homage. Palm branches have long been widely recognized as a symbol of peace and victory. The use of a donkey instead of a horse is symbolic; it represents the humble arrival of someone in peace, as opposed to arriving on a steed in war. During Palm Sunday Mass, palms are distributed which are then blessed. Because the palms are blessed, they may not be discarded as trash. The colors of the Mass on Palm Sunday are red and white, symbolizing the redemption in blood that Christ paid for the world!

<u>Holy Thursday</u>

Wednesday of Holy Week marks the end of Lent. Holy Thursday begins the sacred Triduum – the holiest days of the Church year. Holy Thursday is the general title for Thursday of the Triduum but another name of Holy Thursday around the world is Maudy Thursday. The word maudy comes from the Latin word Mandatum (commandment) and is the first word of the Gospel acclamation: "I give you a new <u>commandment:</u> Love one another as I have loved you." *John 13:34*

Holy Thursday celebrates the institution of the Eucharist as the true body and blood of Jesus Christ and the institution of the sacrament of the priesthood. At the Mass, the priest washes the feet of 12 people to symbolize Christ's washing the feet of His 12 Apostles, our first bishops and priests. This Mass stresses the importance Jesus puts on the humility of service and the need for cleansing with water, a symbol of baptism. After Holy Thursday Mass, the altar is stripped and no Mass is celebrated in the Church until the Easter Vigil which celebrates and proclaims the Resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Good Friday

Good Friday is the English designation for the day of crucifixion and death of Jesus Christ. It is the most somber day of the Christian year. The origin of the term, *Good*, is not clear. The Catholic Encyclopedia indicates that it could have come from God's Friday; others suggest it is not English but comes from the German Gute Freitag. It also could have been based on a Medieval use of the word, good where it meant *"holy."*

The principal Good Friday liturgical celebration is known as the celebration of the Lord's Passion and includes: a liturgy of the word; the adoration of the Cross; a Communion service using hosts already consecrated.

PROCESSIONAL GOSPEL: "Hosanna to the Son of David; blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord; hosanna in the highest." (Mt 21:9b)

FIRST READING: The Lord GOD is my help, therefore I am not disgraced. (Is 50:7a)

PSALM: My God, my God, why have you abandoned me? (Ps 22)

SECOND READING: He humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. (Phil 2:8)

GOSPEL:

But Jesus cried out again in a loud voice, and gave up his spirit. And behold, the veil of the sanctuary was torn in two from top to bottom. (Mt 27:11-50-51)
